Students must have a clear understanding of the English language with advanced beginner level English language skills according to the evaluation and reference system of The Common European Framework.

READING SKILLS

Students can read factual academic texts with a satisfactory level of understanding. They can use skimming and scanning to identify important details and answer comprehension questions. They can make basic inferences or guesses about the text using headings, pictures and captions. They can infer the probable meaning of a few unfamiliar words from short, familiar contexts. Students can determine the purpose of the text or the author. They are able to take basic notes on a text on a familiar topic in their field of study. They are also able to summarize and paraphrase a factual text on a familiar topic.

LISTENING SKILLS

Students can understand simple factual information on everyday or work-related topics. They can identify both general messages and specific details in clear speech. They are able to make basic inferences in simple conversations on familiar everyday topics. Students can understand the main points of clear standard speech on familiar topics, including short narratives. They can also follow a clear standard presentation on an unfamiliar topic, using their knowledge of presentation structure and organization. They are able to take basic notes during a presentation about a familiar and unfamiliar topic.

Objectives of the Course

SPEAKING SKILLS

Students can use a wide range of language to navigate most situations likely to arise while traveling. Students can use quantifiers, adjectives, collocations and phrasal verbs to create more detailed and interesting communication. They can engage in impromptu conversation on familiar topics, exchange information, and express and develop personal opinions on familiar, personal or everyday topics. Students can describe and make inferences about a variety of images. Additionally, they can use inference skill to create connected stories about the image.

WRITING SKILLS

Students understand the basic structure of an academic paragraph and can identify and produce each of the main components. Students are able to write effective cohesive paragraphs that follow academic writing conventions. They can differentiate between informal and formal tone and writing and can identify and produce various paragraph types. Students understand the basic structure of an academic 5 paragraph essay and can identify and produce each of the main components. Students are able to write effective cohesive essays following academic conventions.
